Environment CSP Notes

There are four target areas in this CSP:

1 Preserve Resources:

This area relates to but not exclusive of forestation, Earth Day activities, reduction of energy consumption, air and water pollution, wetland conservation, water projects, disposable of waste and gardening.

Club Project Example: Prepare a presentation about your watershed for a school or community. Discuss water quality threats, including the dangers of polluted runoff and ecosystem loss.

2. Protect Wildlife and Domesticated Animals:

This area relates to but not exclusive of birding projects, Audubon Society, native plants for animal food, Department of Natural Resources, preserving wildlife management areas, endangered species protection, wildlife protection, and animal shelter and humane society support.

Club Project Example: Be a bird watcher; contribute by gathering scientific data.

3. Live Sustainably:

This area relates to but not exclusive of recycling, zero waste projects, the Environmental Protection Agency, sustainable gardening, locally grown food, renewable energy, reduce consumption of purposes, reusable items and upcycling of items.

Club Project Example: Host a fun time with upcycled items for purchase.

4. Beautify Communities and Enjoy Nature:

This area relates to but not exclusive of adopt-a-highway, clean up days, nature walks, teaching others about nature, yard of the month, garden tours, master gardening, plant and tree identification, hiking and biking, national and state parks and clean water projects.

Club Project Example: Be a part of your communities Clean and Beautiful, host a trash pick-up day in your community, or

volunteer at a national or state park.

Welcome to the GFWC/lowa 2022-2024 Health and Wellness Community Service Program. As one of President Nancy's Special Projects, each GFWC/ lowa club is challenged to spend the next two years engaging in local community projects that promote awareness and support services for those suffering from mental illness. I look forward to learning and sharing your experiences as you reach for this goal and report it in your annual report.

The national health and wellness chairperson, Dale Fischer, plans to provide each of the state chairmen with information and project ideas to share with clubs via a bimonthly newsletter. I have received the first newsletter, and I will forward it on to the district health and wellness chairmen. They in turn will send it on to the individual clubs in

their district. Following are a couple of articles in the newsletter:

"The three components of the Health and Wellness CSP are disease awareness and prevention, nutrition, and physical and emotional care. Disease awareness and prevention is the knowledge of the factors that cause disease (including social determinants and health inequity), the symptoms and the ways to prevent it. This is to include screenings, vaccinations and shared information. Nutrition is a key element in the guest for good health. Wise food choices, proper usage of vitamins and supplements, and food allergy awareness help maintain a healthy lifestyle free of weakened conditions and chronic illness. Physical and emotional care encompasses behaviors to manage a healthy body, mind and spirit throughout life. This includes physical, intellectual, emotional, spiritual, environmental and social well being."

"September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. Wear gold or display a gold ribbon to bring awareness to childhood cancers in September. Why gold?

Gold symbolizes how precious children are and illustrates the resiliency of childhood cancer heroes. How can GFWC members and clubs help? Support our GFWC Affiliate St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Per their website, "The mission of St. Jude Children's Hospital is to advance cures and means of prevention for pediatric catastrophic diseases through research and treatment."

- Organize or participate in an existing Walk/Run for St. Jude.
- Partner with a local school and collect Caring Coins during September.
- Sponsor a party for the classroom that collects the most money.
- Encourage students to dress up as *healthy heroes*, provide snacks and offer activity sheets.
- · Make Waiting Room Fun Bags.
- Dedicate a brick on the St. Jude campus pathway.

GFWC Creative Writing Contest Short Story Writing Contest and Poetry Writing Contest for Members

The Contest Rules for these contests are on page 29 of the GFWC/Iowa Bluebook.. Short stories can have a maximum of 2,000 words. Poems can be from 8 to 50 lines long. Entries from the GFWC/Iowa contest may be entered in these contests if prepared according to the rules. Of course, entries do not have to be entered in the

GFWC/lowa contest to be eligible. Each entry must have a GFWC Creative Arts Waiver. Entries are to be sent to me by **March 1**.

Youth Short Story and Poetry Writing Contests

We have had very few entries for the contests. During most years, only one or two clubs submit entries. Every club in the state could do so. You could work with the schools in your community or have a club contest. Entries in both contests have four categories (three or four grades per category). Perhaps you could have a contest in just one or two categories. The GFWC Creative Arts Waiver is required. Entries are to be sent to me by March 1.
